

Petersgate Infant school - Pupil Premium Statement



The Pupil Premium is allocated to all children who are currently known to be eligible for Free School Meals or have been eligible at any point in the last six years. It is also allocated to children who have been looked after for 1 day or more, are adopted or have care under a Special Guardianship Order or Residence Order.

The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address the currently underlying inequalities between children eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) and their peers by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most.

The Pupil Premium is allocated to schools and is clearly identifiable. It is for schools to decide how to spend Pupil Premium, allocated as they are best placed to assess what is needed. However, they will be held accountable for how they have used this additional funding to support pupils from low-income families.

New measures will be included in the performance tables that will capture the achievement of those deprived pupils covered by the Pupil Premium. Schools are also required to publish online information about how they have used the Pupil Premium. This will ensure that parents and others are made fully aware of the attainment of pupils covered by the Premium.

2. Barriers to future attainment 2019 - 2020

In School Barriers

- Pupils in receipt of Pupil Premium funding also have Special Educational Needs (39%) Also, some children eligible for pupil premium lack vital skills and understanding in reading, writing and maths, this makes it difficult for these children to access learning objectives at age-related expectations (ARE)
- Some pupils have significant social, emotional and mental health difficulties and require ELSA support
- Some pupils have lower self-esteem and motivation demonstrating a lack of resilience in the face of challenge
- The number of families of pupil premium children require family support
- Some children eligible for pupil premium have poor language skills, particularly with regards to subject specific vocabulary. This prevents them from understanding new concepts and hinders them joining in discussions.

External Barriers 2019 - 2020

- Attendance and punctuality can be a concern for some pupil premium children (2018 2019 -94%)
- A proportion of pupil premium children's families do not fully engage with school or support their children's learning at home, especially in reading and carrying out homework
- Some pupils eligible for pupil premium are experiencing social or emotional difficulties
