### Health & Wellbeing Tip

Despite the wintery weather and dark and

gloomy days, it is important to try and get outside, if you can. Make the most of a break in the weather and go for a walk and take in your surroundings. It is amazing, even at this time of year, that you can start to see the seasons change.

Why don't you go to Butser Hill or to a local wood and become a tree detective? Some trees have hollows so big that you can climb inside, while others have tiny cracks where minibeasts hide. You'll have to investigate every nook and gnarl of your tree to really get to know it.

Crouch down to look at the roots of your tree, or clamber to the very top of its branches. Measure how wide its trunk is with your arms. And use your hands to feel the texture of its bark – is it bumpy, rough or smooth? You could make a rubbing with paper and a crayon to reveal the lines and patterns.

Look up. Are your tree's leaves dancing in the breeze? Are there any flowers or seeds growing there? Listen for birds or squirrels who may be hiding or making their home. You could even search your tree for scars, and try to imagine what may have caused them: a storm, an animal or something else?

### Attendance and Punctuality

We have noticed over the last half term that attendance is dropping across the school.

I want to take this opportunity to thank families for working with us regarding your child's attendance across school. Attendance is a focus for all schools nationally and the school has to regularly monitor, track and report attendance data figures. The school day is timetabled for different subjects for each point of the day, so even a small portion of missed school for an appointment, being late or other reasons, has an impact on your child's education.

### Important—Health Information

You will have seen the news regarding the rise in cases of measles in London and the large outbreaks in the West Midlands.

The UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) has now declared a national incident in order to focus actions to limit the spread. Further outbreaks of measles will spread to other towns and cities unless urgent action is taken to increase Measles, Mumps and Rubella (MMR) vaccination uptake in areas at greatest risk. Children who get measles can be very poorly and some will suffer life changing complications.

To support this incident the Department of Education (DfE) has published: What to do if you think your child has measles and when to keep them off school guidance for parents and for schools.

UKHSA have stated that measles is not currently circulating in the south-east, there are cases in London and a sustained outbreak in the West Midlands (specifically Coventry and Birmingham but now in all local authority areas in the region) but at the moment in the SE, rashes are more than likely to be for other reasons (particularly in children). However being prepared is important.

At a national level UKHSA are working on an outbreak pack for, similar to the packs for scarlet fever and gastric illness. We will cascade this when it is published.

### **Health Information**

With temperatures dropping this month Clare Joy – an NHS school nurse working locally – explains in this short video some top tips on keeping winter bugs at bay and using the Healthier Together app for advice.

It can sometimes be hard for parents to know the best way to help children recover from winter bugs.

Healthier Together has been developed by local clinicians and gives simple advice on how to help them get better at home.

The app will also help you to spot the signs if it is something more serious and guide you to the right help.

### Monday 19th February to Thursday 28th March

In 2018 Veg Power formed a key partnership with ITV and together created the Eat Them to Defeat Them campaign. This multiaward-winning campaign combines the power of advertising with a schools' programme and moves away from traditional five-a -day messaging to a concept designed for children – one they find fun and engaging.

The campaign has involved a collaboration of creative talent, celebrity support, local government support, schools and catering companies. We created a positive buzz and a central narrative which puts the parents and kids on the same side.

Now in its sixth year, nearly 5,000 schools across the UK and over 1.5m pupils have taken part. We have evaluation data which confirms that repeated involvement in the campaign leads to increased veg consumption over the long term. 53% of parents with children involved in the schools' programme reported an increase in the volume and variety of vegetables consumed. With 29% of children eating less than one portion of vegetables per day, these results are an important step in improving children's diets and the health of our nation.

If you would like details of the programme and impact please check out the full report or watch a short video on the website Each week a family favourite vegetable will be featured. Children can collect stickers and learn catchphrases to go with the vegetables.

We want to encourage children to try each vegetable three times so that they become part of their daily diet.

We'll be encouraging kids to get those gnashers to work defeating those veg one big bite at a time, and we are planning some great chomp visuals and fun. Chomping on raw veg is also excellent for dental health – so double win!
