Health & Wellbeing Tips

Getting outside over the Christmas holidays can help blow the cobwebs off and burn off some of that Christmas dinner. Here are some simple ways to get out and about this Christmas:

Spot some wildlife on a nature walk—Does your little one love animals? Why not spot some local wildlife on your winter walk and tick off a list as you go? Winter is a great time to look for animal prints in the mud and snow — why not follow the tracks to see if you can spot the animal behind them? You may see a squirrel scurrying up a tree or a rabbit dive into the undergrowth.

Create a texture walk—Discover new sensations and turn your wander into a texture walk, making your adventures more tactile and exciting. Texture walks are great to help children build sensory awareness as it encourages them to use their senses to connect with the natural world. Take some paper and crayons with you to create rubbings of different natural textures you can find along your way.

Go Geocaching—Geocaching involves using a GPS-enabled device to navigate a specific set of GPS coordinates to find the 'geocache' (treasure) hidden at that location. You can find out more on **geocaching.com** or download a free geocaching app on your phone. Try Queen Elizabeth County Park as a starting point.

Plan a rainbow hunt—Create your own rainbow out of different colours you can find in nature. There are many colours to spot outdoors, from red and orange autumn leaves to green grasses and the yellow centre of a flower.

- daylight and at dusk when you're heading to and from school
- If you're out and about when it's dark, wear reflective gear to make sure you can be seen in car headlights Reflective vests, sashes or wristbands work well. Remember, fluorescent clothing doesn't work after dark!
- Don't forget to accessorise! Even small items such as clip-on reflectors, armbands and stickers on your outfit or school bag are a great way to improve your visibility.
- If you like to cycle, remember that it's the law to have clean and working lights at night (white at the front, red at the back), as well as a rear reflector. It's good to fit spoke reflectors too.
- Of course, 'Being Bright' isn't the only way to stay safer. If you're out at night, choose routes and crossing places that 5 are well lit and remember to always use the Green Cross Code.




Fidgets are Tools NOT Toys

Over the last few weeks, we have seen an increase in pupils bringing 'fidgets' into school. There has been a rise on social media of people using and promoting these for children. However, there is a very clear difference between a 'fidget toy' and a 'fidget tool'.

A 'fidget tool' is used to support a child with their concentration and can be used as an appropriate way to expel excess energy. What may be a 'fidget tool' for one child may be a toy for another.

As an Inclusion Team we discuss weekly key behaviours we are seeing and the right kind of support needed for your child. Therefore, we will carefully consider if a 'fidget tool' is needed for a child. Only fidgets allowed in school are those that have been carefully considered and trialled by the Inclusion Team at Petersgate. Any others are not permitted to be used in school. Please can we ask if personal fidget tools be kept at home.

Parking

Please can we remind parents not to park on the yellow zig zag lines outside of the school. This is causing problems with parents bringing their children into school as they do not have a clear view of the road and we have had a few complaints of cars being blocked in.

As per the <u>police.uk</u> website, local councils can issue motorists with penalty charge notices (PCN) for waiting, stopping, or parking on yellow zigzags if restrictions are in place. These are issued by civil enforcement officers. Fines can vary depending on location.

When picking up or dropping off children at schools, you should do the following:

- Allow yourself plenty of time as the area is likely to be busy.
- Do not park on yellow zigzag lines and avoid parking opposite them.
- If you decide to park further away, please be considerate of local residents and avoid blocking driveways or access ways.
